

# Southwest Region Human Trafficking Service Inventory and Needs Assessment

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## Background and Methods

In 2019, a small research team developed a [needs assessment](#) and demographic snapshot of human trafficking in the State of Missouri and the neighboring Metro East St. Louis area of Illinois. The needs assessment data were reanalyzed in 2021 and now reflect [CATE](#) regions. A research team also developed a [resource guide](#) of key resources survivors are most likely to indicate needing/ using. In 2020-2021, a small research team quantified the resource guides, developing a comprehensive service inventory. This report includes regional needs assessment and service inventory data, along with brief descriptive narratives depicting identified resource gaps.

## Service Inventory

In the largely rural Southwest Region of the state of Missouri, service inventory data reveal some key themes (see Table 1). Resource scarcity overall is apparent in the data across all the counties, with the exception of food pantries in Greene county. Service availability is comparatively higher in Jasper and Green counties compared to other counties in the region, however, services are limited in these counties as well.

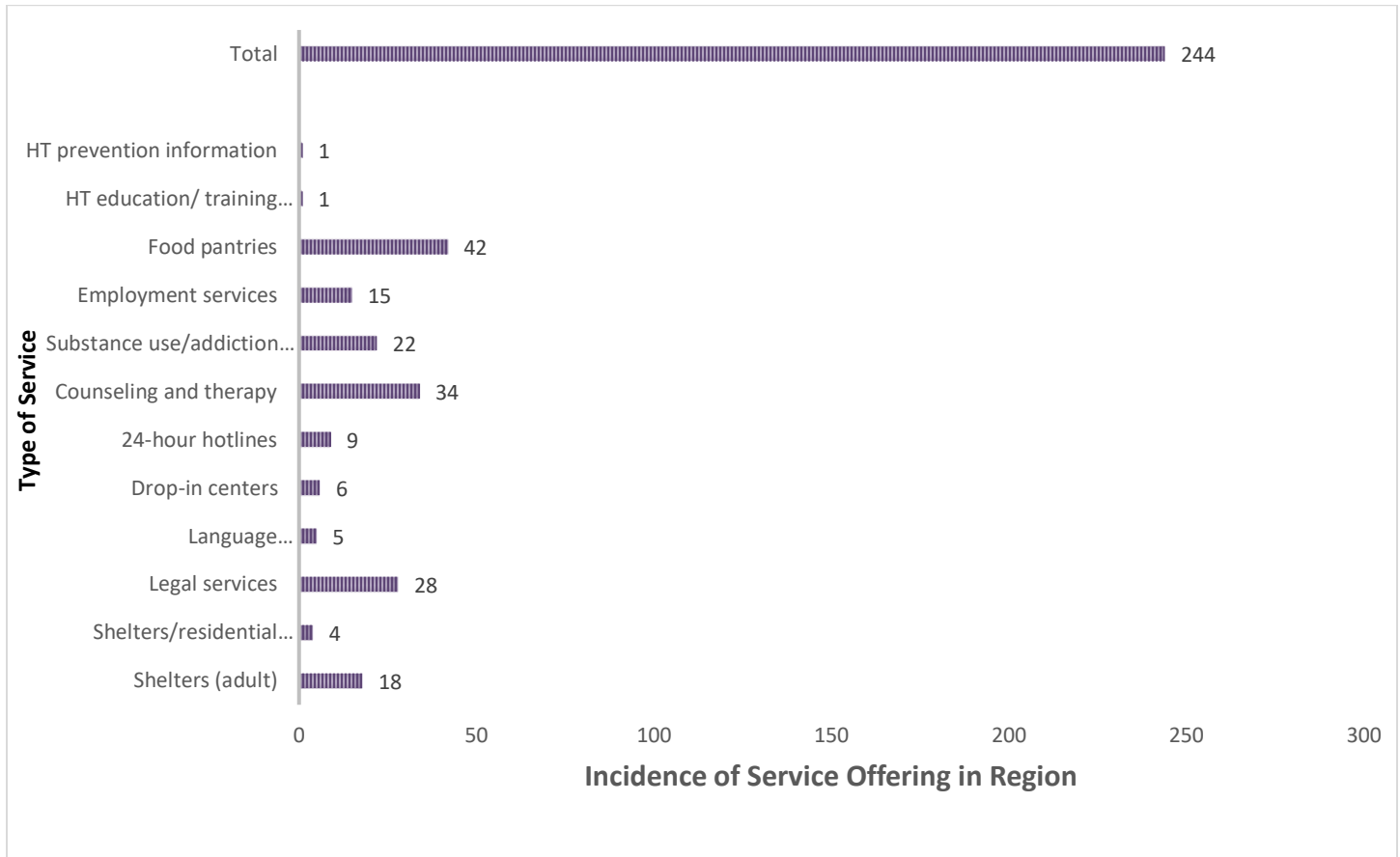

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Note: Services were only counted in the counties they were located in to avoid duplication of counts, although service providers often serve neighboring counties and some serve statewide.

When combining service inventory data for the region, services that appear to be significantly lacking include human trafficking prevention information and education and training options, as well as drop in centers, language access services, and shelter/ residential homes for youth (See Figure 1).

**FIGURE 1: SOUTHWEST REGIONAL SERVICE INVENTORY**



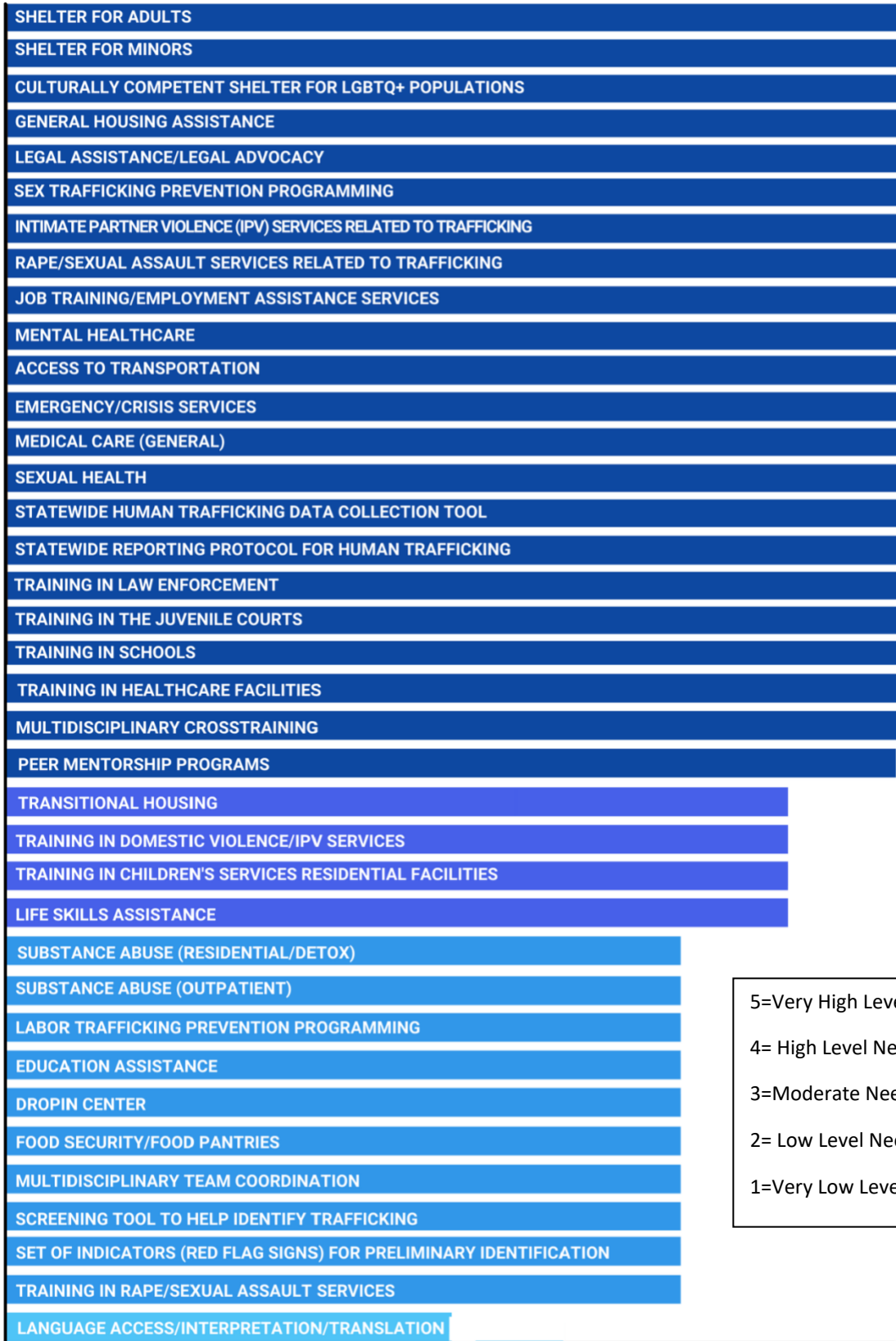
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### Needs Assessment

Needs assessment data complements service inventory data to show not only service availability, but what service providers indicate is needed in their region (see Figure 2). Needs assessment results parallel the service inventory data, indicating a region with immense needs and service gaps. Very high level needs include shelter and housing, legal services, sex trafficking prevention programming and peer mentorship, medical and mental healthcare, transportation, emergency crisis services, and job training/ employment assistance. All of the needs were very high or high level needs, with the exception of language access services, which were reported as moderately needed. Despite food pantries and mental healthcare showing as the most prevalent services in the

region, they both ranked as high level and very high level needs respectively, suggesting that the demand for such services exceeds the availability.
